personality, the wait for his people did not take long. The same day Bubble Guppy became available for adoption, his new family spotted him and took him home! He goes by Dart these days and loves zooming around the yard and finding sunny spots for naps.

Thanks to Seattle Humane's transfer program, caring foster families, expert teams and amazing adopters, dogs like Dart get a second chance at life and families get to experience the joy and companionship of having a pet.

Partnering for the Future of Veterinary Medicine

It is hard to believe it's been more than 10 years since Seattle Humane and the WSU College of Veterinary Medicine began a critical partnership to help advance the field of shelter medicine. Time flies when you are saving lives! The partnership was forged in 2013, with a mission to provide the next generation of WSU veterinary students hands-on training for a wide range of surgical procedures and increase the shelter's capacity to spay and neuter more shelter pets and offer additional medical services to other shelters in need.

Seattle Humane's Schuler Family Medical Center provides fourth-year veterinary students with the opportunity to gain surgical experience in a shelter environment. During the two-week rotation, students receive training in various specialties, including dentistry, emergency care and animal behavior.

The partnership has been a tremendous success. Since its inception, more than 500 veterinary students

have rotated through Seattle Humane. Ultimately, this critical partnership will reduce the number of unwanted and stray animals in our community and has enabled us to provide improved medical care not only for our shelter animals, but also for low-income pet parents in our community.

Dr. Katie Kuehl, Assistant Professor, Shelter Medicine & Outreach in WSU's Veterinary Clinical Sciences Department, oversees the students' shelter medicine training. Additionally, Seattle Humane's Vice President of Veterinary Services, Dr. Jessica Reed, and WSU alumnae-turned-Seattle Humane staff veterinarians Dr. Jenn Herget, Dr. Lauren Restis and Dr. Kristen Shearer, offer invaluable guidance to students.

The benefits of the rotation have not been lost on the students as they move along their journey in veterinary medicine. Dr. Marie Andresen, a 2021 alum who now works as a small animal general practitioner at Roosevelt Station Vet Care in Seattle, reflects on her experience.

"I really enjoyed supporting the community through a variety of programs to provide veterinary care to low-income pet parents. It helped strengthen the spectrum of care approach that I currently practice, where a continuum of evidence-based care options are offered to best meet the economically diverse group of clients that we see in Seattle."

After 10 years, this partnership is going strong and the need for veterinarians is greater than ever. Together we will continue to inspire and educate the next generation.

Seattle Humane Alum, Cooper, Makes Puppy Bowl History

When this shy 7-month-old boxer mix first arrived at Seattle Humane, little did we know he'd become a national celebrity. Cooper was selected to join the starting lineup for Team Fluff and was one of 121 puppies who participated in Puppy Bowl XIX in February 2023. This was also the first time a Seattle Humane alum played in the game's 19-year history and, spoiler alert, Team Fluff won the championship!

Well before his time in the Puppy Bowl spotlight, Cooper and his littermates were pulled from a partnering shelter in Northern California through our Lifesaver Rescue program. When staff learned he'd been exposed to parvovirus, a deadly gastrointestinal virus, Cooper went to stay in a foster home during his required quarantine period. That family quickly fell in love with Cooper and decided he was already home. When Animal Planet reached out to Seattle Humane with an invitation to nominate a puppy player, Cooper was the ideal candidate.

Cooper's road to Puppy Bowl victory was made possible thanks to some key players. His cross-country road trip happened through the amazing support of Peace Vans, who generously donated one of their custom-built camper vans for the journey to the big game. Cooper also received training from former Seattle Seahawks defensive end Shelby Harris, when he visited the team during their summer training camp.

While Cooper may not have won the "Lombarky" trophy for the game, he will always be MVP in our hearts. By participating in this national event, he helped raise awareness for pets in need of loving homes at Seattle Humane and in shelters across the country.


